- 1. **Approval of Agenda:** Mr. Campbell made a motion to approve the agenda. Ms. Link seconded. The agenda was approved unanimously.
- **2. Approval of June 10, 2024, Meeting Minutes:** Mr. Hannan made a motion to approve the agenda. Ms. Link seconded. The meeting minutes were approved unanimously.
- 3. **Board Update:** Ms. Link encouraged residents to get more involved in the Village and added that the Community Engagement Committee is always looking for new members. Ms. Amari wished the residents a happy belated 4th of July. Mr. Campbell shared how much he enjoyed attending one of the Lakefront events.
- 4. **Resident Speak-Out:** No comments were made.
- 5. CA Board of Directors Report—Skye Anderson: Ms. Anderson had nothing to report.

- b. Appointments to the Architectural Committee to Include Celindah Grier, Matthew Heyne and Three Board Members: Mr. Hannan made a motion to appoint Ms. Amari, Ms. Link and Dr. Ball to the Architectural Committee. Mr. Campbell seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

- **c.** Community Engagement Committee Report-Brian England: Mr. England shared that the committee has been working diligently to outreach to the Hickory Ridge apartment community. The committee hosted a successful happy hour in June, engaging with residents. They plan to host another one in September at Asian Palace.
- **8.** Manager Report-Laura Mayton: Ms. Mayton encouraged residents to apply for block party and culde-sac grants. She shared that the field owned and operated by Board of Education behind the Hickory Ridge KinderCare will soon have a handicapped accessible portable restroom.
